#### **Discourse between Yesterday and Tomorrow: New Communes in Twenty-First-Century Israel**

##### **SHORT DESCRIPTION OF THE STUDY**

This qualitative study examined the components of the “generational discourse” of intentional communities (ICs) from the perspective of Karl Mannheim’s generation theory. Few studies have used the discourse of a sociological generation as a theoretical basis for the study of ICs, and those that have been based on empirical examination of the conditions for the emergence of a sociological generation and its manifestations in the generational discourse. The findings suggest that generational discourse can be considered a significant component in identifying the essence and ideas of discourse in new intentional communes as a social language promoting social change.
