Uprising at Auschwitz- Birkenau	Sonderkommandos were work units made up of death camp prisoners who were forced to dispose of gas chamber victims. Cultural Expression	Alongside the hunger, the crowding, and the constant hardship, a rich spiritual and cultural life existed in many ghettos. 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Petr Ginz: Resistance Through Art and Writing	At age 14, Petr Ginz (1928-1944) became the editor-in-chief of a magazine, Vedem ("In the Lead"), produced secretly in Terezin, the ghetto and camp where he was imprisoned. Women who Resisted	The involvement of women in resistance efforts is often overlooked. Escape from the Sobibor Killing Center	On October 14, 1943, Jewish prisoners at the Sobibor extermination camp carried out an organized uprising, luring 11 SS officers to secluded locations and killing them. Nearly 300 prisoners then broke through the barbed wire fencing and escaped, though most were killed in the aftermath by guards, police units, or in the surrounding minefields.
