FBI Hate Crime Statistics	This table shows the numbers of incidents, offenses, victims, and offenders for crimes motivated by bias in 2021. It reports incidents in the following categories: Race/Ethnicity/Ancestry, Religion, Sexual Orientation, Disability, Gender, and Gender identity.
Antisemitic Attitudes in America (2023)	ADL's (Anti-Defamation League) Center for Antisemitism Research published this report from a poll of 4,007 people in the United States conducted in September through October, 2022. It details topline findings on belief in anti-Jewish tropes and anti-Israel sentiment. The report also includes an analysis of the ways in which anti-Jewish attitudes and anti-Israel sentiments converge and diverge, illuminating several new avenues for understanding antisemitism.
Audit of Antisemitic Incidents	ADL's (Anti-Defamation League) Center on Extremism tracks incidents of antisemitic harassment, vandalism, and assault in the United States. Incidents are reported by state/location and summarized over the past decade. Themes include antisemitism in K-12 schools, on college campuses, and in Jewish institutions; bomb threats; cemetery desecration; and incidents related to Israel and Zionism.
ADL H.E.A.T. Map	This is an interactive map detailing incidents of hate, extremism, antisemitism, and terrorism around the U.S. ADL's Center on Extremism developed this visualization with data points taken from news and media reports, government documents, victim reports, and other sources.
